ROBERTSON SCHOLARS LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Community Summer: Just the beginning (of Summers!)

One of the special benefits of the Robertson Scholars Leadership Program is its summer programs. As a Robertson Scholar, you will have access to up to three summers of funded activities:

- I. The *Community Summer*, which follows the freshman year, focuses on leadership through community service and cultural immersion in the United States. Community Summer 2020 will take place in four regional locations—the Mississippi Delta, New Orleans, Edgecombe County, NC, and Whitesburg, KY.
- II. The *Exploration Summer* encourages scholars to move outside their comfort zones—to pursue new educational experiences and/or deepen their understanding of current subject matter. In 2019, Scholars participated in individually-designed projects in Asia, Europe, and Washington, D.C., to name a few.
- III. Finally, the *Launch Summer* focuses on a self-designed experience that “launches” the Scholar into senior year and beyond. In 2019, Scholars were involved in a wide range of Launch Summer activities and internships, including those focused on research, finance, policy, entrepreneurship, and other projects at home and abroad.

Community, Leadership, and Learning

The Robertson Community Summer is designed to foster *community and leadership*. Specifically, we aspire...

- To build strong connections among Scholars;
- To support Scholars’ commitments to the issues that our community partners serve as well as to the partner organizations themselves;
- To challenge Scholars to develop and exercise new leadership skills within the contexts of the Scholar and local summer community;
- To promote connections among the community partners, to enrich the resources available to addressing complex issues.

The class of 2022 described strengthening the following *leadership skills* during Community Summer 2019:

- Interpersonal: patience; perceiving feelings; empathy; praising others
- Time management: being on time; organizing time; deadlines; working under pressure
- Teaching: instructing; explaining; teaching
- Communication: listening; public speaking
- Collecting information: adaptive interviewing; surveys; strategic conversations
- Group process: motivating and leading others; facilitating discussions; persuading; collaboration
- Affect: managing stress; mental toughness; resilience; confidence; positive attitude; patience
- Problem and goal focus: identifying problems and solutions; planning; setting goals; brainstorming; initiative
- Accepting responsibility: stepping up; taking on more responsibilities
- Creativity

This is first step in the series of Robertson summer experiences. Scholars negotiate work relationships; manage money, group living, and transportation; collaborate on projects and activities; and, essentially, learn to live together while learning about a new place. These are not simple activities, and any older Scholar can describe the complicated dynamics that take place among Scholars, mentors, and others during Community Summer.

You’ll also learn about the complex social and economic challenges that face these communities, as well as how community members and organizations address these. You will put your new understanding to use in the

development of a Robertson group documentary, which is a platform for group conversation and analysis about the relevant issues. Furthermore, although this first summer is not solely directed toward specific job skills, you *will* acquire important tools to help you with your school, leadership activities, and other interests. Older Scholars and alumni confirm that the Community Summer provides professional skills and has the added benefit of setting Scholars apart from others when applying for jobs or further education.

Some of the Details

- **Timeline:** The Community Summer begins approximately on **June 1** and lasts for **eight (8) weeks**. Dates vary slightly for some internships. *Whitesburg Scholars begin mid- to late-May.*
- **Housing:** Our program arranges and pays for group housing. Scholars sign housing agreements indicating their understanding of the expectations for taking care of the house.
- **Work:** Critical leadership skills can be gained by participating in community development activities and service. Therefore, with partner organizations, we develop summer internships that include strong mentoring, intellectual content, and a service orientation. The positions reflect a variety of activities and interest areas, such as teaching, grant writing, non-profit management, and the arts.
- **Money and travel:** Scholars receive a stipend to be used for transportation to and from the summer site and during the summer, food and other necessary expenses, and recreational/cultural enrichment activities.
- **Health and wellness:** Our program provides some medical insurance for the summer, although many scholars have their own insurance. Scholars learn to manage their well-being and seek assistance when necessary. Some information is available on the [resource page](#).

Working on Community Summer 2020

Your best strategies to learn about Community Summer are:

- Attend the Summer Showcase November 24 and learn from sophomores about Community Summer 2019.
- Use the Community Summer [resource page](#) to find out who has done which positions. Learn about their experiences.
 - Start with Scholars or alumni you know, and talk to them or reach on Robertson Connect. Read their reports on Connect.
 - Or start with a position you're interested in and see who's done it. Talk to older Scholars (not just sophomores) and alumni who will give you a broader and extremely valuable perspective.
- Think carefully about the specific experiences and skills you want to gain from your own Community Summer and how you want to contribute.
- We will not match you to a position or a place that we expect will be easy for you. Think about how you want to be challenged and be ready to articulate that.

Summer Is What You Make Of It

While each of your summer experiences will differ in the amount of structure that we'll provide you with (and in the level of leadership that we'll expect of you), they all share some important elements. For example, in the end, *it will always be up to you to create and "make the most of" your summer experience* -- we cannot stress this point enough. For Community Summer, although we arrange housing for you and match you to a mentor, *you* will live in that house and manage the dynamics of group living, and *you* must work with your mentor to design and/or revise your work responsibilities. On a related note, *there's a great deal of unpredictability* about these summers. *No one ever has the exact summer that he or she planned.* Scholars consistently tell us that managing ambiguities and adjusting to unplanned changes is an important aspect of their leadership development, although these situations can be confusing and stressful at times.

Several members of a previous class wished we had more strongly emphasized the role of *their initiative* in this first summer. In case that message did not come across in the preceding paragraphs, please know that your

initiative is expected *from the very outset* of this process. The more proactive *you are* (e.g., reaching out to older Scholars for advice, articulating and discussing goals with Vicki, reading all available materials carefully), the more satisfying and productive your Community Summer will be.

Community Summer Advice from Scholars

- *Take the initiative. Your summer will be as challenging, stimulating, and rewarding as you make it. Set goals for yourself with your work, and also realize the importance of your Robertson Scholar community. Make the commitment to have regular family dinners, organize group activities or road trips, and visit other scholars at their places of work to learn more about their experiences. Take full advantage of this opportunity to spend time exploring a new place with an incredible group of people!*
- *Get ready for the hardest and most meaningful summer of your life. What do I mean by get ready? Keep an open mind, prepare to compromise, and always remember why you are a Robertson Scholar.*
- *The summer is not only about the community in which you work, but the community in which you live. Take the time to appreciate your fellow scholars while living together, appreciate their views, strengths, and weaknesses; use your summer as a complete learning opportunity.*
- *Don't cling to whatever mindset you were in before the Community Summer -- you will learn more about yourself, other scholars, and about what it means to be a leader...more than you've learnt in your whole life ...if you just let yourself absorb new experiences in a new place with an accepting mindset.*
- *Do not go into community summer with any preconceived notions about anyone or your job. I kind of did that, and it honestly wasted my first week or two, which I regret. Also, make an effort to get to know other students within the community, because I met some amazing people my age who I will definitely continue to foster friendships with.*
