Maire Amlicke David Boyd	Centro de Salud Monimbo and the Health Situation of the Community in Southern Masaya Centro de Salud Monimbo seeks to draw a big picture of the health situation of the community in southern Masaya through research that would be used to understand the reasons for incidence and occurrence, and to plan and schedule for additional health promotion activities within the community. As part of this research, I will work with the staff at CS Monimbo in order to obtain informed consent from each of the patients participating in the research, develop a grant proposal, and then conduct the research for the final month in Nicaragua.
Ben Ayto Zandie Brockett	Exploring urban development and community capacity building in Hanoi and Beijing No abstract submitted.
Persis Bhadha Tony Brown	Exploring Entrepreneurial Thought in Unexpected Places I plan to explore entrepreneurial thought in unexpected environments. At Oliver Wyman, consulting will require me to bring innovative ideas and processes to current systems to fit changing markets. I hope to witness how entrepreneurial thought is necessary in bureaucratic settings. Next, I will embark on a NOLS course in Ireland, which will require me to use adaptive problem solving. In Palestine, I will improve the garden land and learn about sociopolitical issues facing Palestinians. Following thoughts sparked by a conference in Medellin, I am curious to see how entrepreneurship can enhance the way people live in the Gaza Strip.
Mark Botterill Andrew Byers	Comedy, Politics, and their Intersection The goal of my summer is to pursue two passions of mine and to observe when and how they intersect. This will mean living and working in New York, volunteering for Richard Reichard (a congressional candidate running against a Republican incumbent in Staten Island and tough odds). This will build on my prior experience campaigning in politics in the UK. <p>Maya Durvasula Joseph Tucker</p>	<p>HIV Testing and Sexual Health Preferences among MSM in China: Development of Two Discrete Choice Experiments The purpose of this study is to assess preferences over alternative options for HIV testing and awareness campaigns among men who have sex with men (MSM) in China, through focus groups and individual de-briefing interviews among MSM in Guangzhou. The results of these interviews will be used to develop and refine two discrete choice experiments (DCEs) that will provide quantitative models of preferences over HIV testing alternatives and awareness campaigns.</p>
<p>Diandra Dwyer Katsuhiko Sawamura</p>	<p>Animation, Language and Community: UNC Summer in Japan, Blackfeet Reservation and Digital Media Academy My three-part project this summer encompasses an intensive Japanese language study in Tokyo, Japan, volunteering and teaching computer literacy in the Blackfeet Reservation in Great Falls, Montana and participating in a week-long CG animation workshop at Stanford University. My intent while in Japan is to become an advanced speaker, reader and writer of Japanese and to interview Tokyo-based animators about their careers, to inform my professional endeavors. I intend to volunteer in the Blackfeet Reservation to support the community’s needs and further my awareness about global cultures. The workshop at Stanford University’s purpose is to augment my skillset in animation.</p>
<p>Brady Gilliam Erin Krauss</p>	<p>A Walk on the German Side: Family, Language, and Transnational Queerness This summer, I’ll be living in Berlin, Germany, completing two summer semesters of intensive German language study at the Freie Universität, one of Germany’s top universities. While in Germany, I plan to seek out queer communities in Berlin and visit my relatives at their homes throughout the country. These experiences, among others, will serve as the inspiration for a collection of short nonfiction stories and essays which will together comprise a complete travel memoir. This memoir will make use of my own experiences to explore historical and cultural themes pertaining to Germany, the United States, and “queer” or nonconforming genders and sexualities.</p>
<p>Emily Goldstein Danielle Spurlock</p>	<p>Gentrification and Anti-Gentrification Housing Policy in a European Context Over the course of this summer I hope to explore the dynamics of gentrification in four European cities: Amsterdam, Berlin, Paris and Vienna. Although gentrification has sweeping impacts felt throughout a neighborhood, my focus for this summer will be to examine gentrification’s impacts on physical infrastructure and housing stock. As gentrification commonly occurs in urban areas where prior disinvestment in infrastructure has created opportunities for profitable redevelopment, focusing on the</p>

	<p>physical structures of a neighborhood experiencing gentrification could provide insight into the physical signs of active gentrification. Through the creation of a protocol, which I affectionately call “The Starbucks Index”, I hope to develop a numerical scale; applicable to any neighborhood that would provide an indication of the extent to which gentrification is occurring. The goal is to create a surrogate measure of gentrification, based on an inventory of the physical structures that make up the neighborhood. This measure relies on the assumption that there are common features of gentrification and that physical markers can be used to highlight signs of gentrification. This summer I will put my index to the test by applying it to neighborhoods identified as experiencing gentrification or prone to gentrification in Amsterdam, Berlin, Paris and Vienna.</p> <p>While the question of housing, neighborhood affordability and the push out of historic residents is a global concern, Europe currently finds itself in a particularly interesting position responding to the influx of new refugees and migrants fleeing various conflicts and crises in the Middle East. The scope and scale of gentrification in European cities will directly impact the housing availability and affordability for incoming immigrants.</p>
<p>Alexandra Hehlen Victoria Rovine</p>	<p>Fashion, from New York City to Cape Town This summer I will be delving into the fashion industry and honing my journalistic and business skills – all with a specific focus on ethical and sustainable fashion. I will spend a month in New York City interning for Kenny Flowers, where I will be helping founder Kenny Haisfield style/conduct photo shoots and develop a digital product lookbook. From mid-June to beginning or mid-August, I will be working in Cape Town through a program called Connect-123, which is in the process of connecting me with an internship at an organization that focuses on ethical and sustainable fashion.</p>

I will also gather oral histories to understand what progress is currently being made and what challenges these women face, drawing qualitative conclusions across regions. These experiences will become the foundation for future study. The next decade will be pivotal for foreign policy, as many conflicts will likely capitulate during this time; I want to understand how women can be part of the solution.
Liv Linn John Biewen	Power of Story: Lifting women's voices from Spain to Cincinnati Part I: 5 weeks hiking el Camino de Santiago in Spain. Along the way, I will keep a reflection journal and carry an audio recorder to conduct interviews on women's experiences traveling independently. Part II: 3 weeks researching Berlin's zine culture via archives and libraries, zines being another storytelling medium for women. I will also edit the audio I collected along el Camino into a multi-part documentary with the goal of releasing 1-2 parts per week. Part III: Return to Cincinnati to lead a week-long class for high school girls on radio storytelling through Women Writing for (a) Change.
Sydney McAuliffe Elana Friedman	Sydney's Personal Odyssey This summer I will focus inward; I aim to enrich myself spiritually, challenge myself physically and cultivate my leadership skills. I will embark on a personal odyssey. For five weeks, I will walk The Camino de Santiago, a path extending 500 miles across Spain. I will integrate various teachings of Kabbalah Judaism into my everyday experience. I will spend the second part at my home in Virginia Beach, VA, where I will process and write about the research I have conducted in New Zealand. The final part will take place in Durham, NC, where I will work as an investigative intern for Professor Jim Coleman at the Wrongful Convictions Clinic at Duke Law.</p>

Dr. Meech is one of NASA's lead consultants and Investigators for Astrobiology. During my time with her, I will be participating in research on Astrobiology, focusing primarily on comet data to look for clues to the origins of Earth's water. All of this culminated in my own personal research, enhanced programming and computing skills, and contribution to a project that will be formally published in the fall of 2016. Additionally, while in Hawaii, I hope to discover the island and explore my own capabilities and goals regarding photography.
